# Update from Diane McMurrin



Dear friends,

October marked twenty-nine years ago that Roger and I received a call from the Lord to leave our lives in America and move to Ukraine. He would show us day by day how to bring His Word through music and personal witness to those coming out of a Communist culture; people for whom we had prayed many years but never dreamed we would meet and love.



Our years in Ukraine were so amazing. We saw the Lord provide opportunities that were impossible without His Grace: the many concerts in those early years, the beginning of the church, the widow's ministry as we dispersed food and the Good News of the Gospel, the orphans whose lives were touched by our care, the American tours which brought

us together as partners in this mission, the gatherings in Gorenichi where we lived, the

Christmas concerts in Kyrgyzstan for seven years among the Muslim people, and the concert tour to Russia and the Stans in prominent concert halls with the help of local

Protestant churches.

Each year was packed with excitement.

During the final years of our ministry in Kyiv, it became clear that Roger's health and energy was fading. Roger didn't want the ministry of Music Mission Kiev to end with him. We are so grateful it continues under Ukrainian leadership, several of whom came to Christ through the Gospel message of Music Mission Kiev.

Now we have been living for three years in Lebanon, Ohio, north of Cincinnati. It is a simple but comfortable two-bedroom condo with a lovely patio in the back, which Roger fills with flowers. How he loves flowers! We also have a grand piano which I enjoy. Our local church, Lebanon Presbyterian, is only minutes away. Roger conducted a Christmas concert there



in 2019, and later taught a Sunday school class on Handel's Messiah. I conducted a small children's choir in the fall of 2020.



But most of our time in Ohio is taking time to rest. At 76 and 82, we have entered a new season of life. We have lots of time to spend reading God's Word, praying, and being thankful for each day that He gives us. We also have a black-and-white Bernedoodle dog named Paul Anka.

In January, we finally sold our home in Gorenichi, Ukraine, just outside of Kyiv. We had so many wonderful times there,

sharing it with musicians, widows, the church, and all our friends.

In the coming months, Roger will be teaching another Sunday school class on the book of Revelation. I will be lecturing at a local book club about my Kyiv experiences, based on my book *The Splendor of His Music*. I have spoken at two other book clubs on this topic. We miss the fellowship of the many friends across the United States that we visited as supporters of Music Mission Kiev. Such dear people! We are grateful for your continued support for this unique ministry which is dear to our heart.



### Bible Lesson at Stara Basan Boarding School

FIRST TIME INSIDE THE BOARDING SCHOOL SINCE THE BEGINNING OF 2020

Oksana gave the first Bible lesson at the Stara Basan (Chernihiv region) Orphan Boarding School at the end of October. Unfortunately, the school had been forced to go on holiday until the end of the month, so there were only 20 children left in the school, six of which were new. When our group arrived, they looked at us with suspicion and seemed reluctant to attend the class. But after we introduced ourselves, they joined us and took an active part in all our activities.

In the lesson, we talked about God's promises to Abraham. We told the children that although Abraham had to wait for a long time, he continued trusting God, and God kept His promise. But it did not happen immediately and Abraham had to go through great trials.

At the end of the class, two black girls, Marilyn and Benjamina, who were listening attentively to everything we were saying, concluded that they might also have to wait for a long time, but they believed that God could bless them, too. It was very touching.

Oksana said, "I always look forward to such meetings. In fact, although there were just a few of us, the atmosphere was warm and homey."

Please pray that these children would truly entrust their lives to the Lord and follow Him like Abraham.



# Irina Participates in Children's Trauma Healing Workshop

IRINA RECEIVES CERTIFICATE FROM THE INSTITUTE FOR EMOTIONAL HEALING



A few weeks ago, Irina had the privilege to participate in a Trauma Healing Workshop for Children. She attended the seminar along with 31 other people from different parts of Ukraine. The participants had three days of intensive training and were required to pass two exams. Irina shared, "We had long latenight conversations, as we all have worked with children who have experienced trauma and have vast experience in this field." The group took every opportunity to share their experiences and talk about their work. Those participating had a great time together!

The seminar gave Irina a deeper understanding of how much our children need healing from trauma and, what's more, how desperately they need Jesus. The seminar was a gold mine of information and was relevant and well-presented.

"While working with the material, many of us being trained cried more than once, realizing we also suffered from trauma," Ira reveals. They all recognized as they bring everything to the feet of Christ, their wounds are being healed.

After learning the material, Irina took and passed the exams. She received a certificate from the Institute for Emotional Healing identifying she had completed the Healing Hearts Club course and is now qualified to train others.

We heartily congratulate Ira on becoming certified as a trauma counselor trainer. The timing is a great blessing for our mission as we minister to children in the war zone as well as those in Kyiv. Please pray for Irina and all those wounded souls we are ministering to for Jesus.  ${\mathfrak g}$

The audience was open and receptive, listened attentively, and even took pictures and videos on their phones. Many young people went to the top floor and listened to the music from there. They were definitely impressed.

The program was prepared and conducted by four young conductors, all of whom are KSOC members, Natalya Begma, Serhiy Zadorozhny, Katerina Tomchuk, and Nazariy Tarasenko. Kudos to them and their mentor, Vika Konchakovska.

Serhiy Basarab shared, "I could go on and on praising Vika and the KSOC, but I'd rather give the floor to one of our widows, Libov A. who attended this concert. She posted a message in the St. Paul's group on Viber." Libov posted, "The concert was a great success. It seemed as though these songs were coming from Heaven. Before every song, Oles Pavliutin (the actor who brought us so much joy by reading the texts of spirituals in June) read a passage from the book of Psalms. These scriptures added power to the choral presentation.



Whenever we speak of Donbas or Druzhkovka, we are referring to the eastern front of Ukraine where the military conflict with Russia continues and soldiers are still being killed. This area is a place where we are investing more and more of our time, talent, and treasures to assist people like Valentina and Aleksandr who are under constant threat of losing everything they have, including their life.

Irina remembers when we first met this family. Their son had died in an antiterrorist operation. They also had lost touch with their daughter and didn't even know where she was. Aleksandr (goes by Sasha), the husband, was going blind because of diabetes.

Valia, his wife, attended the local Light of the Gospel Church and often told Sasha, her husband, about God, but he wouldn't listen. She invited Irina to their home hoping her husband would be more willing to listen to a stranger's testimony. And he did listen. At first, Irina told him about MMK and why we come to Druzhkovka. But as soon as Irina mentioned God, he got aggressively resistant. It was a long conversation, and the Holy Spirit was touching Sasha's heart. Irina then gave him a chance to repent and reconcile with God. There was a deafening silence for a couple of minutes, and then they heard, "OK, I'm ready to do it!" Sasha prayed, and they all rejoiced with him and gave thanks to our Lord!

A year passed before our return. Sasha was now completely blind. He also had gangrene on his left leg, which was very painful. Despite her own disability, Valia takes care of her husband. Sasha was happy to see us, and we had a long heart-to-heart conversation. As Irina shared this update with us, tears welled up in her eyes—tears of joy and gratitude for the privilege of serving people.

Aleksandr was a different man—no complaints, no rumblings, no anger! He shared how God helped them cope and how he and his wife read the Bible, prayed, and trusted God together.

We brought them food, and when we learned he had no glucometer because their pension was so meager they couldn't afford even the cheapest drugs, we bought it for him. Wiping away tears, they thanked God and our mission for this support!

Not long after we left, Liuba called to tell Irina that Sasha had died! Liuba and Dima (our missionaries in Donbas) were bringing them medicine, and as Valia opened the door, she shared that he had died an hour before. Dima went to report it to the police while Liuba stayed with Valia and helped wash the body. Then Dima returned, and they laid Sasha's body in a coffin. We are grateful to Dima and Liuba who have big hearts to serve people in the name of Jesus Christ.

We know Sasha is with God now, and it brings us peace of mind and great joy. Thank You, Lord, for not leaving us, sinners, and having mercy on us. 13
