## Trip to Stara Basan

ORPHAN BOARDING SCHOOL

We were excited to put on a Christmas show for the children at the Stara Basan Orphan Boarding School in the Chernihiv region. Oksana shared, "Trips to Stara Basan are special to us as they unite several ministries working together to serve the school. This trip included the MMK youth group (Marta, Evelina, Myroslav, Daniil, and Kiril), Iryna R., a military widow from our widow's program, our friends from Christian Military Fellowship of Ukraine, and others who love caring for the orphans at the boarding school."

The kids were eager to see us. We began by playing games and singing songs together, but the most important part of our program was the performance. After all, we use it to share Biblical truths with the children and they were enthralled with their former camp friends helping in the puppet show.

Oksana engaged the children, asking them to pay close attention to the play to understand the central meaning. The children were all ears during the performance. Afterward, they summarized it stating that "the landlady was evil, but then she became good." When Oksana asked the children what had changed the landlady, there were different answers.

Ruslan, a student who is known for being disruptive and fighting, raised his hand and said, "the meeting with little Jesus changed the landlady." His words impressed Oksana "because he was able to understand that a personal encounter with Christ can change lives and melt even the most evil and selfish hearts."



# Visit with Larisa C.



Larisa has been in our Widow Sponsorship Program for over 20 years. She was first invited to Holy Trinity Church, our first church plant, by a missionary friend. Larisa has been a faithful Stephen minister and is currently awaiting a new homebound widow assignment as a result of the death of her prior appointment. Still, she has already asked Lena if she could continue serving and requested a new homebound widow assignment.

Larisa was born shortly before WWII started. When asked what life was like in Kyiv during that terrible time. She said, "I was left in Kyiv with my mother. Most of the people left in Kyiv were women with children. In order to get some food, women would get together and walk to nearby villages. Though I was little, I remember my mother making skirts of our old curtains. She would trade the skirts for wheat from village women." We were curious about what happened to Larisa when her mother was gone. Larisa shared, "My mother would leave for a day or sometimes two days. She taught me to hide under a bed if someone would walk into our apartment."

Larisa recalls the worst part of that time was finding food. Since they lived in the lower part of Kyiv, they had to go to the central area, which required walking a long way on the only street that led to downtown. "I remember one episode very clearly. Women of our neighborhood took their children and got together to walk up along that street. When we made it to the top, we saw a German officer with a gun. He told us we could not pass. When our group of women with hungry children tried to pass him, he took his gun and started firing into the air. Women and children started yelling and crying and running back. All except my mother and me. I remember the face of that officer. He let my mother and me go downtown. As I look back at that time, I see how God was protecting me."

Larisa had a good childhood overall and after the war her sister was born. Her family continued living in a small apartment in the southern region of Kyiv. Later, she graduated from the Polytechnical University and worked in a factory as a technical engineer for many years. In 1968 she gave birth to her son. Unfortunately, her marriage lasted only a year. Fleeing from an abusive husband, Larisa and her son lived with her parents for the next ten years. At this time, she met and fell in love with a good man. They married and had a daughter together.

When her husband died of brain cancer, Larisa's son was living in Russia, leaving her alone in Kyiv with her daughter. It was a difficult time in Kyiv, and a week after her husband's death, Larisa was told she was going to lose her job. She recalls, "I remember I was praying all night long asking God to help me keep the job. And He heard me. The following morning I was told that I was the only elder worker in our department whom our factory leadership chose not to fire. I knew it was God's answer to my prayer. I learned about Christ from my missionary friend, and when I came to Holy Trinity Church I was amazed by the music. I joined the congregation choir and began serving as a Stephen Minister. I am so happy I know Jesus."

Larisa now lives with her daughter. The photo shows Larisa with a handmade blanket that Greg brought along with other presents during his visit to Kyiv in September. We are happy and honored to serve widows like Larisa with you.
